

Community Foundation Receives \$250,000 Commitment from Delta Dental to Sponsor Plaza on Riverfront

THE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION RECEIVED A \$250,000 pledge from Delta Dental to sponsor a new plaza in the new Rotary Park on downtown Lansing's riverfront. The Foundation will match the gift for a total of \$500,000, devoted to its master plan for riverfront development.

"Delta Dental is committed to building healthy, smart, vibrant communities and this investment will ensure our downtown riverfront is

a thriving hub of activity," said Margaret Trimer, Dental Dental's director of communications and corporate citizenship. "As a major employer in the region, we are dedicated to bringing energy and economic revitalization to Greater Lansing."

Construction on the new Delta Dental Plaza will begin this winter, with completion slated for spring 2019. It will include public seating, shade sails, planters, string lighting and an outdoor fireplace.



"Delta Dental shares the Community Foundation's vision of a vibrant urban core that will attract and retain a talented workforce," said Laurie Baumer, the Foundation's executive vice president and leader of its riverfront development projects. "This is a big part of the riverfront's renaissance and we're thrilled Delta Dental is a part of it."

To date, the Foundation has received commitments totaling \$850,000 for riverfront development projects. In addition to Delta Dental, contributors include Rotary Club

of Lansing Foundation, Auto-Owner's Insurance, Gillespie Group, Team Lansing Foundation/Lansing Convention and Visitor's Bureau, four individual contributors and in-kind support from the Lansing Board of Water and Light. These contributions will be matched dollar for dollar by the Foundation, for a total so far of \$1.7 million to invest in downtown Lansing. Foundation funding for the riverfront and other placemaking projects comes from the Foundation's Leadership Fund, apart from its regular grantmaking dollars.





American Fifth Spirits: Mixing the Best of Michigan

"IF IT DOESN'T LOOK, SMELL OR TASTE RIGHT WE FIX IT before we move on." These are the words of Rick Wyble, head distiller and president of American Fifth Spirits in Lansing's Stadium District.

The concept of opening Lansing's first legal distillery began the end of 2008. Due to the great recession, banks were hesitant to help with funding. As a result, the project remained dormant for several years. However, Wyble and his partners never gave up on the idea of opening Lansing's first distillery.

In 2013, a local developer contacted Wyble's partner about available real estate and the process of finding their future home, located at 112 N.

Larch Street in downtown Lansing, began. After the addition of more investors, a government shut down in October 2013 and eight months of planning with the city, Wyble and his partners finally received a building permit.

American Fifth Spirits opened in April 2015. Through the years, the company has been using local ingredients to create high quality, innovative spirits. Since opening, they have been gaining the attention of not only the community but surrounding areas.

"We have customers bring their friends and family from out of town to showcase American Fifth. They feel what we're doing is a really great representation of the upward trend happening in Lansing," said Wyble. "I love seeing people react to our tasting room. It's pretty amazing."



American Fifth Spirits serves over 50 cocktails and update the menu the 5th of every month. This allows them to play with fresh, seasonal ingredients. All juices are freshly squeezed and syrups and liqueurs are made from scratch.

"Everything we do is by hand, completely sensory," Wyble said. "At larger corporations, it's all about numbers. For example, if you taste American Fifth bourbon versus other major label producers, there's a noticeable difference in the depth of flavor because of the quality of ingredients we use."

Wyble and his team believe you can't fully appreciate what American Fifth is doing if you don't

understand the process.

"We're an open book. If you have a question on how to make a spirit or cocktail we gladly give it out," Wyble said. "People think what we do is magic but distilling has been around a long time and I'm happy to explain the process."

Wyble encourages the community to support Lansing made products and Michigan agriculture by asking for American Fifth Spirits at your favorite bar, liquor store or restaurant.

Chamber Celebrates Small Business Saturday® in Greater Lansing

U.S. Shoppers Report Record High Spending of an Estimated \$17.8 Billion

THE LANSING REGIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE was pleased to once again support the small business community throughout the Greater Lansing region for the ninth annual Small Business Saturday on November 24. Created by American Express in 2010, Small Business Saturday is a day dedicated to supporting small businesses nationwide. Celebrated every year on the Saturday after Thanksgiving, the day has given small businesses across the country additional exposure and an economic boost.

Recognizing the importance of supporting small, independently-owned businesses in our community, the Chamber encouraged residents of the tricounty region to take part in Small Business Saturday by visiting their favorite small businesses and purchasing the various goods and services offered.

The ninth annual Small Business Saturday kicked off the holiday shopping season for consumers and small, independently owned businesses with record levels of reported spending. Total reported spending among U.S. consumers who said they shopped at independent retailers and restaurants on the day reached a record high of an estimated \$17.8 billion, according to data released today from the 2018 Small Business Saturday Consumer Insights Survey from American Express and the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB). Based on this annual survey over the years, Small Business Saturday spending has now reached a reported estimate of \$103 billion since the day began in 2010.

The survey also found that an estimated seven in ten (70 percent) American adults are aware of Small Business Saturday. Among consumers who said they shopped small on the day, 42 percent reported shopping with family and friends at independently owned businesses, and 83 percent reported encouraging others to also shop or dine small. Shoppers also turned out for online small businesses - among consumers who said they participated on the day, 41 percent reported that they shopped small online.

"We are pleased to support Small Business Saturday in our region, as more than 80 percent of our membership is comprised of small businesses with less than 15 employees," said Michelle Rahl, vice president of member engagement for the Lansing Regional Chamber. "We will continue to support our entrepreneurs and small business owners in any way possible. Partnerships, such Small Business Saturday, allow the Chamber to drive additional attention and revenue to our local small businesses."

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



Sparrow Health System Names New Experienced, Dynamic CEO

The life span of **new** technologies and technology companies be quite perilous.

The increasingly rapid acceleration of innovation leading to the emergence of new products can make today's hot technology obsolete seemingly overnight. Tech startups can be the darling of Wall Street one day and on the sidelines the next.

Okemos-based TechSmith is a local company that has become a global success story and managed to maintain long-term market success, a level of which is not often seen in the software industry. Founded in 1987, TechSmith pioneered the revolutionary idea of capturing screen content for better communication. Today, TechSmith is the world's number one source for visual communication software and is a global leader in screen recording and screen capture software.

The products that put TechSmith on the map are Snagit, a screen capture software and Camtasia, a screen recording and video software editor. has been on the market for 27 years and continues to grow, recording its best quarter in history in the past year. TechSmith has managed to stay on top of changing market trends and shifts in market demands and continually update their bedrock products to keep them at the forefront of the industry

"Today our growth is based on the increased use of digital media," said Wendy Hamilton, chief executive officer of TechSmith. "What our engineers have been extraordinary about is understanding customer problems and having an incredible passion to invent and innovate technology to solve those problems."

Snagit and Camtasia are the industry standards in screen recording, screen capture and video editing software. Those two products are used by every company in the Fortune 500, by 97 of the top 100 higher education institutions in the United States and are in use in 193 countries around the globe. It is estimated that using those two products, people around the world have produced nearly one billion YouTube videos.

TechSmith's research highlights how companies in the U.S. could unlock nearly \$100 billion in productivity by increasing their use of visual and video content in workplace communications. Hamilton points to shifting demographics, particularly the millennial generation, which grew up on video and gets a lot of their education and entertainment from videos.

"So, when they enter the workplace, they expect that same kind of access to digital media that they have in the personal lives," said Hamilton. "They expect to be able to create a quick video and be able to communicate just like they would if they were using Snap Chat or Instagram as opposed to writing some long, boring text in an email. They also expect their senior leaders to use video as well."

Snagit is something that any employee can use for quick visual communication. Many of TechSmith's clients literally buy the product for every single employee as they try to modernize the way in which coworkers communicate with each other.

TECHSMITH'S LEADERSHIP TRANSITION

TechSmith was co-founded by Bill Hamilton, Wendy's father in 1987. Like most tech startups, TechSmith survived the first few years and paid the bills through consulting contracts. The launch of Snagit in 1991 changed everything for the firm and helped turned a small, unknown company into a firm recognized by users around the world.

Wendy Hamilton became CEO at TechSmith in 2014, a move that she readily admits was a surprise.

"I never planned to be here," said Hamilton. "I always thought my dad would sell this company. It wasn't part of any planned career path, but it worked out."

Though the path to TechSmith may not have been part of a master plan, Hamilton's impressive career certainly equipped her for her role as CEO. Out of college, she joined Anderson Consulting, later known as Accenture, where she managed large scale system implementation projects. She left the large corporate setting to join an Adobe venture tech startup, Liquent. That company focused on creating publications for pharmaceutical companies. After that firm was sold, she landed at Thomsen Reuters, a \$15 billion public publishing company where she eventually became general manager of their life sciences business.

Taking the reins from her father brought its own challenges. Hamilton admits that she was a bit slower to push for some changes, out of respect for the way Bill Hamilton always did things.

> "One of the things my father did that I didn't realize was really important at the time was that he stepped out of the business right away," said Hamilton. "We had a couple of months where we both had to decide if this was going to work before I moved my family from Philadelphia to Michigan, and then once we made the decision jointly, he got out of the day-to-day execution literally overnight."

> The transition also brought starkly contrasting leadership styles. Bill has a military background and employed a more traditional command and control style of leadership. Wendy relies on broad collaboration and seeking diverse opinions throughout the organization. One of Hamilton's biggest fears in taking over the company was that employees wouldn't tell her when they thought she was wrong.

> "My style is to encourage contrarian thinking and inclusive decision making," said Hamilton. "We want to debate. We want to respectfully disagree with one another, so we are making decisions with the best information and insight."

> TechSmith involves people in decision making in many ways. The company utilizes Yammer, a corporate online social media platform, which allows team members to ask questions and bring up different points of view. TechSmith also employs focus groups and has added an employee liaison to help communicate questions about strategy and innovation.

TALENT ATTRACTION AND RETENTION: AN EMPLOYER OF CHOICE

Tech companies in general, particularly those located in the Midwest, struggle to fill critical jobs. It is estimated there are 50,000 unfilled tech jobs in the U.S. Only one in five tech jobs are being filled by U.S. graduates. For TechSmith, now with 285 employees, a partnership with Michigan State University has been a cornerstone in the company's efforts to identify and attract talent to the company.

"TechSmith would not exist in Lansing if it were not for MSU," said Hamilton. "If we didn't have this large engineering school producing great talent, we would not have the talent pipeline to grow our company."

TechSmith works with approximately 30 interns a year, a large majority of which come from MSU and are an important part of the company's talent pipeline.

The small number of women in technology continues to be a disturbing trend. About one in five college graduates in computer science are women, a number that is actually decreasing. Many young women drop out of computer science tracks as early as sixth grade. Locally, TechSmith is active in supporting STEM programs in education and also supports STEM work at Impression 5 Science Center.

Throughout its history, TechSmith has placed a high value on being a company for which people want to work. TechSmith has managed to attract and retain great talent by becoming an employer of choice. Hamilton credit her father's role in establishing that culture.

"His life philosophy was 'you spend too much time at work to not like your job," said Hamilton. "Culture and how we treat our employees have always been a huge part of this company."

TechSmith is very transparent with its financial statements, providing employees with as much information as they want to know. The company has what Hamilton calls an open-book management policy, encouraging employees to feel good about the company and to see where they can help improve operations. The company shies away from terms like "executive" opting instead to refer to top leaders as "senior leaders." Hamilton says there is a culture of equality at Techsmith.

"Anybody is allowed to talk to anybody and anybody is allowed to challenge anybody," said Hamilton. "As long as it is respectful and the challenge is about the idea and not the person."

Hamilton installed a position known as the employee and community ambassador,

a younger employee who can support TechSmith's heavily millennial employee population. That individual is responsible for understanding what benefits employees are interested in having and prioritizing and executing those benefits. The company also has installed an employee help and service line for legal services and emotional support services. Additionally, the company has a very generous healthcare package.

"We try to keep things fun and social, while encouraging employees to meet other employees from different departments," said Hamilton. "We have free Friday lunches and monthly happy hours on site, hosted by different departments."

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

As the company looks ahead, long range trends indicate that employees throughout the world are going to continue to push their organizations to become more aggressive in the use of videos.

"For employers to invest in that, it will have to become cheaper and easier," said Hamilton. "It also needs to become more collaborative because that is how you save time."

Hamilton expects TechSmith's portfolio to be diversified and include collaboration-based cloud tools that make desktop tools more efficient. The company has also released a new product to help customers make professional looking videos faster. Hamilton forecasts more interactivity, especially in educational videos.

In the immediate future, TechSmith will be launching its software in China for the first time in 2019, continuing the company's impressive global growth trend.

TechSmith's formula of combing visionary leadership, effective innovation strategies and the ability to attract and retain outstanding talent leave Hamilton confident that the long-term growth outlook is good.

"I think the future looks pretty bright for us," said Hamilton.



Practical Cyber Security for Small Business: Incident Response Planning

"A CYBERSECURITY INCIDENT IS NOT JUST AN IT PROBLEM. It is a business productivity problem, a legal problem, a public relations problem AND an IT problem." There is overwhelming evidence today that organizations of all sizes are continuously faced with cyberattacks. Developing a strong defensive security posture, training workers about the threats and how to respond, and planning how to act when something bad happens are essential to reducing your risk and associated losses from a cyberattack.

In this article, which is the conclusion of a four-part series on Practical Cyber Security for Small Business, we'll explore the language and practical application of Cybersecurity Incident Response Planning. Let's start with defining key terms, explore why we need to properly prepare, then provide resources and guidance to get you started.

INCIDENT, UNAUTHORIZED ACCESS, DATA BREACH

A cybersecurity "incident" can be anything from a policy violation such as a worker reporting that a co-worker left a sensitive document or password in plain view, to an alert indicating unusual sign-in activity on an email account, to an alert from an anti-virus program that something unusual occurred, to a report from a worker that they received a non-delivery report for an email that they never sent. An incident doesn't necessarily mean something bad happened. Incidents occur daily in most organizations, regardless of if you are paying attention or not. Incidents require a trained individual to investigate the validity and severity of the incident, then determine what, if any, further action is needed. "unauthorized access" is a finding or determination that someone without authorization may have gained access to a physical location, an email account or sensitive files (electronic or paper). In the physical realm for example, if a file cabinet containing payroll records is found unlocked, we may reach a conclusion that an unauthorized person had access to those files, but we have no verifiable evidence of who, when or if they copied or stole any of the information. A "data breach" is a finding that "sensitive, protected or confidential data is copied, transmitted, viewed, stolen or used by an individual unauthorized to do so." A data breach is determined when there is verifiable evidence that malicious activity has occurred. In cyberspace, verifiable evidence is often elusive. Because expert attackers are also experts at hiding their tracks, it often takes substantial effort to put enough pieces together to conclude that a breach has occurred.

WHY PREPARATION IS SO IMPORTANT

The major focus of cybersecurity professionals is to reduce the likelihood of a breach in the first place. However, we've learned over time that highly skilled and highly motivated cyber criminals often find ways to compromise our fragile data systems, despite our best efforts. That is why it is critical to develop a comprehensive incident response plan (IRP) before an incident occurs. When something bad happens and emotions are running high, a response plan helps you and your team respond with discipline and effectiveness. The plan should define roles and identify the internal employees and vendor partners who will execute specific procedures to determine the scope of the threat, contain it and begin to recover from it. Beyond the technology steps, your plan should include crisis management and communication procedures such as who is authorized to speak on behalf of the organization, what they will say and when they will say it. Additionally, the response plan should contain procedures for notifying legal counsel and your insurance company, both of whom will have experts to help guide the post-breach process. Tapping into these experts during the planning process will certainly provide value during a crisis. Another advantage of

proper preparation is that you will achieve clarity of who is doing what, providing alignment between everyone involved. In a recent report, IBM Security estimates that on average, an organization will save 10 percent of the total cost of a breach if they have an IRP in place.

Planning and preparation can only occur before something bad happens. 

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Early Childhood Education: Quality and Access Pay Off

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE **SUCCESS** and well-being of our community begins with investing in highquality early childhood education for children from birth through age five. Creating and sustaining a comprehensive approach to early education and intervention results in many benefits for the community. Recent research has focused on early education as an investment in several ways: 1) a school readiness strategy, 2) a way to close



achievement gaps for disadvantaged children and 3) an economic development

Three of these recent reports from the Minneapolis Federal Reserve Bank, the University of Chicago and the High/Scope Educational Research Foundation conclude that investment in early childhood development yield a significant return on investment in terms of school and life success as well as \$8 for every \$1 invested. By making greater investments in young children, a community will see greater returns in education, health and the economy.

By age five, a child's brain is 90 percent developed. This is a critical time in which to shape the cognitive and character skills necessary for success in school, health, career and life. Adverse, at-risk and disadvantaged early environments create deficits in skills and abilities for young children that drive down their adult productivity and increase social costs, thereby adding to the financial deficits borne by the public. Early childhood education can prevent these achievement gaps and improve health outcomes, as well as reduce school drop-out, poverty and crime.

Several high-quality, evidence-based early learning and development opportunities are currently provided to young children and their families across Eaton Regional Education Service Agency (RESA), with programs such as Great Start Readiness, Early On, Head Start and the Eaton Great Start Collaborative. Over 1,200 young children and their families are being positively impacted by these efforts.

Our economic future depends on providing the tools for upward mobility and building a highly educated, skilled workforce. Early childhood education is the most efficient way to accomplish these goals. Research and data supports the need for a high-quality early childhood education for every child in our community. This effort will require an investment of time and resources from all stakeholders, including government, education, human services and the business sector.
