2nd Thursday Economic Development 8AM Union Bank Tennant Station Human beings crave both change and stability. Hopefully 2019 will be a year when we can find a healthy balance between these competing needs.

Some major business changes under way in the South County area include the recent sale of Honda of Morgan Hill (soon to be renamed Victory Honda), the bankruptcy and subsequent County of Santa Clara acquisition of St. Louis Hospital and the De Paul Medical Center, the sale of Infineon's RF power device division (and that division's Morgan Hill HQ) to Wolfspeed/ Cree and the sale of Mission Bell Manufacturing. This past year saw major new businesses such as Golden State Assemblies move to Morgan Hill as part of their rapid expansion. We also continue to see major construction throughout the city, notably including the new four restaurant complex built at the site of the formerly derelict closed storefront at 3rd and Monterey and major mixed use projects nearing completion on Depot Street in the downtown core complementing the nearly built out Granary District on Depot's northern end. These past few years have seen over \$50 million of investment in Morgan Hill's downtown core after at least two decades of stagnation, and the majority of that money has come from private investors. Communities throughout our region look enviously at what is going on in downtown Morgan Hill. Even though that news is mostly positive, it has come with consequences for some of the smaller businesses which can only survive in a relatively low space rent cost environment. The redevelopment and reinvigoration of downtown Morgan Hill has made it too expensive for users who historically would have located there.

After many years of relative stability, we find ourselves in the midst of many local elected leadership changes. Morgan Hill's city council has two brand new members, John McKay and Yvonne Martinez-Beltran. Although they are new to their elected positions, both were sitting planning commissioners until their election and thus bring with them an understanding of local development policies and practices. Given the City Council's large role in development issues their combination of experience and history of community engagement should serve the community well as they take on bigger responsibilities. Morgan Hill also has a new mayor for the first time in many years, Rich Constantine. Again we are fortunate that Mayor Constantine served two terms as a council member before winning the mayoral election.

Numerically the biggest local government change was the election of five new Morgan Hill Unified School District Trustees. Shortly after the election, Trustee Murillo (holder of one of the two trustee positions not up for election) announced her decision to resign as of the end of January. The remaining Trustees intend to appoint a replacement through a public interview process. Please have a look at mhusd.org for details of the planned replacement trustee appointment process.

New state assembly member Robert Rivas brings us new representation in Sacramento. Mr. Rivas was until recently a county supervisor in San Benito County while also being both a high school counselor in Hollister and an instructor at Gavilan College. Expect to see a lot of Member Rivas as he continues being visible and engaged throughout the region he serves.

Rivas worked his way through college to earn a Bachelor's in Government from CSU-Sacramento, and later obtained a Master's in Public Administration from San Jose State University. Then, he worked for Assemblymembers Simon Salinas and Anna Caballero. These experiences allowed Rivas to spend time in his community, get to know the concerns of his neighbors and assist the Assemblymembers as they advocated for their constituents in Sacramento.

Encouraged by community members who followed his years of work in local government, Rivas first ran for Supervisor in 2010. Voters responded to his energy and passion, and he won with over 70% of the vote.

During Rivas' eight years of service on the Board of Supervisors, he fought to create more affordable housing and worked with the business community to bring jobs to San Benito County. He led efforts to repair local roads, reduce traffic congestion, and negotiate contracts with local firefighters to reduce costs and expand access for rural residents. While he stood up for transparency on the board, he also became a fierce advocate on behalf of the environment. Rivas will always listen to the needs of his community—whether they relate to the environment, transportation, education, jobs, housing, or healthcare. He works on the following committees within the California State Assembly: Agriculture, Appropriations, Government Organization, Local Government, and Rules.

Avoid a Lawsuit and Understand Your Ongoing Responsibilities

Many small businesses are sued every year for not providing features that enable disabled persons to readily access their business. Take steps to ensure that your building or business complies with the accessibility requirements of California Building Code, ADA Guidelines, and all state and federal regulations pertaining to accessibility. Remember that accessibility requirements may evolve over time, and are an ongoing responsibility. This fact sheet outlines the most common current accessibility requirements and provides resources that can help you comply.

"To, Through and Within" Rule Applies in California

By meeting the accessibility requirements in Title 24 of the California Building Code, a building or business owner will meet federal ADA construction guidelines. The stricter state code provides the minimum requirements to ensure that buildings and related facilities are accessible for every member of the public. The essential rule in state code is that access is to be provided "to, through, and within the buildings where the general public is concerned." Here are the top three requirements for bringing an existing building -regardless of building use or "occupancy classification" -into compliance with California Building Code:

Small Business ADA Lawsuit Workshop: Notes

Speaker- Eric Blomquist, Building Official, City of Morgan Hill

A city's building department is tasked with enforcing the California Building Codes at the local level, however it is NOT the building department's task to enforce Federal ADA Law compliancy. Any structures built prior to 1992 are grandfathered in and do not need to satisfy the current Building Codes, UNLESS a permit is submitted for improvements/upgrades on the building. At that point, 20% of the funds of a project of \$161,000 will need to be routed towards "path of travel" upgrades. When purchasing a property you assume 100% of the liability for that space including ADA compliancy issues that have not been addressed.

Speaker- Roger Miller, CASp Accessor

Ignorance of the law is NOT an excuse! Every business owner was notified of their compliance responsibilities in the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. This act was meant to protect disabled individuals, identifies as those who can "participate in day to day life." Over 50 million people in the United States are disabled and that number is expected to double by 2030. The disabled represent a 3-trillion dollar market segment when factoring in their family, friends, co-workers, clients, etc. There are a total of 715 Certified Access Specialists or CASps. These specialists are hired to inspect a building, draft a report of noncompliance findings and implement a plan for improvements. Most ADA Lawsuits address parking space, ramp, signage, loading zones, access, counter height and hardware issues. Having an active implementation plan in place can reduce the probability of an ADA Lawsuit.

CASp Surveys can cost between \$1,500-\$2,500

Speaker- Naomi Hayashi, Farmers' Insurance:

Most businesses have some kind of insurance. Make sure that you have EPLI (Employment Practices Liability Insurance) which covers set attorney fees for 3rd party lawsuits and sometimes even covers CASp Inspections! EPLI is also bundled with Products Liability Insurance. Please review the document attached below.

Speaker- Josh Jachimowicz, Jachimowicz Law Firm:

If you are served with an ADA Lawsuit first check your insurance policy, second call your attorney and third document EVERTYHING with pictures, employee interviews, etc. There is no pre-litigation notice required to be served prior to an ADA Lawsuit being issued and once you receive the lawsuit paperwork you have 21-30 days to respond to the lawsuit before a default judgment is issued. If you lease the building your business resides in, who is liable for the lawsuit? The general rule of thumb is anything
