## **Chamber Business Agenda**

#### Flood Recovery

The Chamber traveled to Washington DC to provide statements on behalf of business and area recovery. Solutions to processes that block recovery were offered. The Chamber has been, and continues to be, a valuable information source on recovery and provides input on business recovery.

#### <u>Business & Education Partnership — Job & Career Development</u>

The Chamber applauds our parish's education system on flood recovery. The Chamber supports the ten year millage on the fall ballot. Business & Education Partnerships through the Chamber include opportunities to connect with and mentor students, programming to assist students in understanding the employer's perspective, soft skills and career paths. Employable, career ready students and community college efforts are also Chamber initiatives.

#### Minimum Wage

Business owners advise that minimum wage is should continue to be determined by market forces. Businesses currently pay more than minimum wage for qualified, skilled workers. Wages should be tied to experience, skill and market variables.

#### **NFIP Premiums**

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) reauthorization expires on September 30, 2017. While the financial stability of the program must be addressed and growth in the private flood insurance market encouraged, the program must be reauthorized to allow homeowners and businesses to purchase flood insurance at reasonable rates.

#### Transportation | Infrastructure | Roads

The Chamber aligns with local elected officials and priorities include Hwy 447, Hwy 190, continued efforts to widen I-12 to the state line. The Chamber also encourages and supports the opportunity to provide roads and connect all communities to shopping and other opportunities in Livingston Parish.

#### Internet Sales Tax

The Chamber supports collection enforcement of internet sales tax to ensure local businesses are not at a competitive disadvantage.

#### Insurance Premiums to Business & Access to Affordable Healthcare

High premiums and deductible continue to spiral crippling small business on medical insurance, general liability, workers compensation, and flood insurance. The burdens and costs to small business are astounding, and the Chamber strongly advocates for solutions, including underlying issues, to this immense problem. The Chamber recognizes the need for quality and accessible affordable healthcare for Livingston Parish.

#### Taxes & Regulatory Issues

The burden of taxes and regulatory compliance on business are impeding growth and diverting resources. Business resources in this regard have been stretched to the point of breaking. The business community seeks a diplomatic approach and solution to this problem.

#### A Message From Leadership

A strong working relationship between government entities and the business community in Livingston Parish is essential to the growth and economic prosperity of the parish. The Chamber Governmental Affairs Committee works diligently with local, state, and federal elected officials to ensure that the concerns of the business community in Livingston Parish are carefully considered when weighing legislation and decisions that could impact business growth, job creation, taxes, commerce, and regulatory statutes.
