

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2012 SAILING SEASON BEGINS

The Ten Mile Lake sailing season officially begins Saturday, June 23, with a couple of important changes to the sailing schedule.

First, because July 4 falls on a Wednesday this year, we've moved the Fourth of July race to June 30 and the Memorial Cup to July 7. That way, people spending the week at the lake will be able to take in two races on successive Saturdays.

Second, we've added two "fun races" -- which can also serve as make-up races -- to the schedule. We all know how fickle the weather has been in recent years, and this will give us a chance to get more sailing in.

So we now have seven races in total: Four headline regattas, two fun races and a tune-up race.

Races begin at 1:30 p.m. Saturday. In case of foul weather, the races will be held at 10 a.m. Sunday.

Eisenhower 'boathouse papers': The untold story

Some of you may have read about the drafts of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's famous farewell address that were "discovered" in the Moos boathouse two summers ago.

Actually, we knew they were there all along -- right next to the Lazy Ikes (a fishing lure), Daredevils, hand drill and other flotsam we've accumulated over the last 50 years at the lake.

But my father (Malcolm), the chief speechwriter for Eisenhower in the late 1950s, said Ike (the president, not the lure) had told him to burn the papers.

My father just couldn't bring himself to do it, and neither could we after my father died 30 years ago. So these eight or so boxes of official White House correspondence stayed in a corner of our boathouse for decades.

Until, that is, we needed a place to store those large pink sailboat buoys I inherited from Commodore Tom Siqveld several years ago.

My sister, Kathy, dragged the boxes out and said we should do something with them. And that's just what we did -- shipped them off to the Eisenhower Presidential Library in Abilene, Kansas.

And the rest, as they say, really is history. The director of the library told the [New Yorker magazine](http://www.nytimes.com) that the new

documents will "change the history and interpretation of the most famous farewell address in American history."

But the moral of the story is this:

If it weren't for sailing on Ten Mile Lake, we would have never fully understood how Eisenhower's historic warning of a "military-industrial complex" came to be.
