

#### 2018 SAILING SEASON BEGINS

The 2018 Ten Mile Lake sailing season begins with the Fourth of July Race on June 30 followed by the Memorial Cup the following Saturday on July 7.

Having the races on back-to-back weekends gives us the best chance that people who come to the lake that week can participate in two races.

We'll do the same thing for the Moxness Cup and End of the Summer race. Those races will be on July 28 and Aug. 4, respectively.

There are two open weekend Saturdays on the schedule – July 15 and July 22 – that we'll reserve for make-up races and sailing clinics, if there is interest.

As usual, the first race begins at 1:30 p.m. In case of foul weather or no wind, the races will be held at 10:30 a.m. Sunday. If you have any questions, email the commodore at <a href="mailto:grant.moos@gmail.com">grant.moos@gmail.com</a>.

We'll have the traditional sailing kickoff party at the Moos cabin following the races on June 30 -- about 4:30 p.m. Until then, get your boats tuned up and we'll see you at the Fourth of July

Dick was an excellent sailor and instructor who taught many of the current generation of Ten Mile Lake sailors how to sail. His daughter, Mimi Garbisch Carlson, and son, Tom, are still active members of the sailing club.

Our club began in the 1930s when Dick, Jim Brandt, Bob Buck and Jimmy Gamble began racing around three buoys anchored around the lake.

Although Dick stopped racing several years ago, he took a keen interest in the sailing club, which has continued to hold its annual awards ceremony on his beach in his honor.

#### Light wind marks the 2017 season

The 2017 sailing season was characterized by some of the lightest winds in recent memory at all four of our regattas.

Two of the second races – at the Memorial Cup and the End of the Summer regattas - were canceled due to a lack of wind. And we struggled to find enough wind to hold the other regattas.

But the season did create some memorable moments. After we delayed the start of the Memorial Cup race, Committee **Boat Volunteer** Ed "Pete" Crandall noticed there was a wind line off Loufek's Point.



So Ki Hoffman quickly set up a wonderful short course, Tom Brandt Jr. had a superb port start and sailed to an early lead, and there were multiple wind shifts to keep things interesting. Ki ended up winning the race, followed by Grant Moos and Tom Brandt.

Then the wind died again – a pattern that repeated itself all summer long. But it was great to see Tom Brandt Jr. out for two regattas, capturing third places in both.

Pete Roberts had an excellent season, sailing to first place finishes in both the Fourth of July and the End of Summer regattas. And Grant Moos won the Moxness Cup regatta.

The Summer Series trophy – which is awarded to the sailor with the highest cumulative score from all the races during the season – was won by Grant Moos. Ki Hoffman came in second followed by Pete Roberts in third.

Let's hope for more consistent winds this year. But no matter the wind or the weather, it's always great to be out sailing.
