

**Unit Topic: Leadership** 

Activity Name: Lesson #2, Qualities that Make Good Leaders

# Objective/Rationale:

1. Students will be able to identify some of the qualities of a good leader by brainstorming and generating a list of leadership qualities with their classmates and instructor.

2. Students will be able to write a short paragraph that discusses what they feel are the 3 most important leadership qualities necessary to become a good leader and how they will use these qualities in their future by choosing from the list generated by the class.

**Time Frame: 50 minutes** 

#### **Materials:**

- White board and markers
- Paper and pencils for students
- Writing Rubric (page 3)

### **Directions/Procedure:**

- 1. Have the students, with the assistance of the instructor, generate a list on the white board of the qualities they feel make a good leader.
- 2. Some of the qualities you may want to stress are:

a strong self-confidence, open mindedness, calm in difficult situations, passionate, inspiring, good sense of humor, assertive and able to make decisions, able to delegate tasks to others, generous, respectful, self- aware, enthusiastic, positive and optimistic, visionary, persistent, trustworthy, good cognitive skills, emotionally stable, responsible, personable, insightful, effective communication skills, honest and up front, good integrity and focused.

- 3. Once the list is completed have each student pick the <u>3 qualities</u> they feel are the most important to their future success in becoming a good leader. Have them write a short paragraph discussing the following points below.
  - How exactly will you apply these 3 qualities to your future academic/ career goals? (Be specific!) An example-the next time my boss asks me to attend a team meeting on Time Management I am going to be open-minded about it and attend.
  - Why are these 3 qualities the most important to your success in becoming a leader in your field
    of study and/or career?
     (Be Specific!) An example-by attending the team meeting, I may learn something new that could make
    me and the people I work with more productive, therefore benefitting the company's overall productivity.
- 4. Have them share their paragraphs with the class.

Very Poor		Lacking effort. Very poor grammar mechanics. Very unclear.
		Does not address topic. Limited attempt.
