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Activity Name: Lesson #2, Marshmallow and Toothpick Towers

Objective/Rationale:

- 1. Students will be able to understand the benefits and challenges of team work and the importance that strong leadership and effective communication skills have on the success of the team, by working as a group to build a "Marshmallow and Toothpick Tower."
- 2. Students will be able to discuss and apply the information they learned about team building to real life experiences by answering a series of reflective questions upon completion of the Marshmallow Tower.

Time Frame: 50 minutes

Materials:

- 1 pack of marshmallows per group
- 1 pack of toothpicks per group
- List of questions for students to answer upon completion of activity, pages 3-4 (Feel free to add your own and/or adapt these)
- Group Work Evaluation form, page 5
- Discussion Rubric, page 6

Directions/Procedure:

- 1. Divide the students into groups of 4. Give each group a small box of tooth picks and a small bag of marshmallows.
- 2. Explain to the groups that their job is to build the tallest free-standing structure they can, using only the tooth picks and the marshmallows.
- 3. They will have 20 minutes to do this and their structure will be measured by the instructor upon completion of the structure. All teams will be given the same amount of time to complete the structure.
- 4. Once the towers have been completed and measured hand out a list of the reflective questions for each group to answer. The answers must be written in complete sentences. Make sure all group members participate. (See page 3-4) Roam around room to monitor discussions.
- 5. Collect the written responses from each group and have a large class discussion on what they have learned about team building in general from this activity? Use discussion rubric on page 5. Have each student complete the Group Work Evaluation form to access group's work.
