

Greetings! As the chair of SIG-III of 2015-2016, it is my great honor to introduce this issue of Newsletter. There are stories on our excellent traditions such as the International Reception at the 2015 ASIS&T Annual Meeting and InfoShare Awards. You will also find information on some of our upcoming activities.

Over the past years, our SIG has built a track record of excellence and leadership in international information issues. Thanks to our previous chair, Shimelis Assefa, and the board officers, our SIG had a big growth in membership last year, from 123 to 161 (a 20% growth). We hope we will continue our efforts in retaining our members and recruiting new members, especially those in developing countries. Last year, our SIG worked with the International Relations Committee

In 2015, our InfoShare program (http://www.asis.org/SIG/SIGIII/news/infoshare) awarded ASIS&T memberships to seven individuals (five professionals and two students). In the ASIS&T annual meeting in St. Louis, MO in 2015, our SIG co-sponsored four panels that involved international issues.

In 2016, our InfoShare program has been highly successful. Thanks to Anindita Paul for her effective coordination, we have 13 awardees (9 professionals, 3 students and 1 transitional) which is a high record. This gives our SIG a jump start of this year. Grateful for Selenay Aytac's initiative, our SIG supported one panel proposal submission to the ASIS&T Annual Meeting 2016. Currently, Zamir Hassan is taking the lead on a proposal to the special project fund for innovative ideas that involve collaborations among SIGs.

The International Paper Contest in 2016 was a success. Thanks to our contest officers and participants, we have selected winners for both 2015 and 2016! Six awardees will be awarded two years' ASIS&T memberships and the two first place winners will have travel support to attend the ASIS&T annual meeting at Copenhagen. A special thank goes to Taylor & Francis who has generously donated \$3000 to sponsor the International Paper Contest, which makes it possible to support two first place winners this year.

We will continue our good tradition of the international paper contest, international reception and silent auction in the annual meeting of 2016. 2015 SIG Cabinet Meeting

There was a discussion about webinars and having them open to everyone even if they are not members. There was talk of creating a task force to collect data about the users of the webinars with Toni Carbo taking the lead and looking for volunteers to help her with it.

The SIGs submitted 17 panels to the Annual Meeting 2015. 8 were accepted and 9 were rejected. A committee was formed to help the panels that were rejected to get ready for submission to the next Annual Meeting in Copenhagen. The committee will also provide feedback on papers before people submit. Committee members: Karen, SIG Ed, Jeremy SIG AH & Michael SIG STI.

There is \$10,000 for funding for a SIG project. There was a discussion about what would be a good project. 2016 International Paper Contest Announcement

We had a busy year planning for the 2016 paper contest. Calls for proposals were sent out March 3rd, 2016 with a deadline of May 31st, 2016. With permission from the Chair, we included the papers received in 2015 for consideration alongside the 2016 papers. We had 5 papers from 2015 from India, Nigeria and Pakistan and 8 papers in 2016 from Algeria, Ethiopia, Iran, Nigeria, Pakistan and Zambia. The great team of jurors worked on a rubric that was used to grade the papers during the month of June and July. The results below were published on August 2nd, 2016.

First Place winners:

Treasurer's Report

The SIG allocation for this year was \$646. The Art Exhibition Sponsorship was \$100, thus the remaining fund available is \$546. Please note that the SIG has to spend all of its allocation (\$546) until Sep. 30th, and any unused amounts will be forfeited and subtracted from funds at fiscal year-end. The fund balance carryover from prior year is \$16,123. Thus, resulting in: Total Funds Available of \$16,669.

The Info-Share Program's beginning balance was \$5,430. Donations (Raffle/Silent Auction) were \$883. Expenses from Info-Share memberships were \$299, resulting in Ending Balance of \$6,014.

The Digital Scholarship Fund's beginning balance was \$4,570. After the donation of \$3000 by the Taylor and Francis Group, there is an ending balance of 7,570. These funds will be utilized for the International Paper Contest Winners 2015 and 2016 along with ASIS&T memberships. Mentorship Program

Besides working on his dissertation proposal, Zamir has been working closely with SIG-III on a proposal of introducing MOOC through YouTube with the aim to promote LIS education worldwide particularly in developing nations. He has crafted a proposal and is undergoing reviews with fellow SIG III executive officers. Apart from SIG III, he has been active with other SIGs, namely SIG ED and local ASIST student chapter. Zamir is currently the co-chair of SIG ED. He plans to organize collaborative events from the banner of SIG III and SIG ED. Zamir has been active in organizing events from University of South Carolina Student Chapter where he's the outgoing chair. He has recently organized, in association with fellow chapter officers, events on film archiving and cyber security.

International Calendar of Information Science

By Borchuluun Yadamsuren and Michel Menou -Webmaster, ASIS&T SIG-III The calendar suffered over the past few years from a number of constraints beyond control. It was originally run on a commercial platform the cost of which was covered by a sponsor from the publishing industry. A link to the calendar appeared on the main page of ASIS&T web site.

In Spring 2014 SIG-III Chair decided to switch to Google Calendar and include the calendar under SIG-III's own web site. Later on the ASIS&T web site went through a wide restructuring. An unfortunate consequence was that the calendar disappeared from the screen. As a result it eventually reached a 0 hit level against an average of 150 in 2013. When this was noticed in January 2016, it was decided to create a link to the calendar under the "Events" section. Special announcements eventually appear on the main page (e.g. on May 4, 2016). Consequently, visits to the calendar are now back to "normal". For the period February to May 10, 2016 there were 290 unique visitors from 42 countries (a majority from USA and Canada). 21 countries show only one visitor. Visitors from 28 countries spend one minute or less on a page.

Another issue was the input and moderation of entries directly submitted by conference organizers. The original team of Simmons students slowly disappeared after Caryn Anderson's departure from Boston and had to be substituted. Dr. Muhamad Sajid Mirza took over in 2013. He was replaced from 2014 till now by Mrs. Borchuluun Yadamsuren, both endeavored to cope with the tasks. As a senior member of SIG-III who takes charge of this job for many continuous years, Michael makes great contribution in content input and coordination.

A number of open or commercial calendars for scientific events, both general or specialized, are now available on the web. As one may expect information science stricto sensu, or related areas, are hardly identified. The questions to consider and act upon are thus whether the international calendar of information science conferences offers a valuable service to the community, and whether it is contributing to a growing outreach of ASIS&T. If the answer is yes, then we need to discuss how to streamline its production and enhance its quality and effectiveness within ASIS&T or in conjunction with another entity that runs a calendar of scientific events.

For the period May to December 2016, 103 events are listed. This shows that on average an international conference related to the broad field of information science(s) is running every day somewhere in the world. When it is not five or six, it becomes a fact worth meditating and investigating.

2015 SIG III Annual Business Meeting Minutes

SIG III Annual Business Meeting Monday, November 9, 2015@2:45pm-4:15pm Meeting Minutes provided by Shimelis Assefa

Shimelis Assefa, outgoing Chair of SIG-III, Presiding

Welcome and Introductions – Shimelis Assefa, outgoing Chair of SIG-III opened the meeting and welcomed the SIG members and cabinet representatives. Xiao Hu, incoming chair joined the meeting via Skype. Before starting the meeting Shimelis asked SIG members to introduce themselves one by one. Shimelis acknowledged Toni Carbo for her contribution to SIG-III as a founding member and for her continued support to the cause of the SIG. Shimelis noted that Toni has brought over 30 items for the silent auction that will take place later in the evening. SIG members gave a round of applause to Toni and thanked her immensely.

Introduction of the Newly Elected/ Reelected Officers

Shimelis reported that an online form was sent out to members before the conference to self-nominate or nominate others for open positions. He read the names of new officers for 2015-16. He also noted there were still positions that were not filled and he asked from participants who will volunteer for – InfoShare (2 positions), Co-chairelect for 2016-17, and communication officer (1 position). Anindita Paul volunteered for the InfoShare position. Election of the officers was conducted online ahead of the Annual Meeting. He presented the list of new officers for 2014-2015.

Approval of the 2014 Business Meeting Minutes

A copy of the 2014 business meeting minutes in Seattle, WA was distributed via email prior to the conference. Shimelis called for motion to approve the minutes and it was approved unanimously.

Chair's Report (Shimelis Assefa)

The Chair shared the full report through e-mail prior to the Annual Meeting. In the business meeting, he highlighted the major points.

- Membership growth based on the membership roster data, SIG-III membership registered a big surge in members count, from 123 in 2014 to 161 members in 2015.
- One issue of the newsletter was published (http://www.asis.org/SIG/SIGIII/sites/default/files/201 5/%3F02/sigiii newsletter 14 2 2015.pdf)
- Working with IRC, new fees structure to benefit individuals and organizations in developing countries was established.
- Awarded membership benefit to seven individuals (5 professionals and 2 students) through InfoShare program
- Nominations and elections were made for the new officers, including chair-elect for 2017.
- SIG-III has sponsored and co-sponsored 5 panels.
- Although the international paper contest jury team worked hard to evaluate and select winners out of 5 submissions, due to delays and transparency issues, Shimelis have decided not to go ahead and announce the results. The papers for this year will be re-entered for next year's contest.
- The Website has been erratic and it was not working as it should for the better part of the year.
- The chair's full report is attached.

Treasurer's Report (Naureen Nizam)

• Naureen Nizam, our treasurer, was not present at the meeting. Shimelis summarized the treasurer's report on her behalf.

SIG Cabinet Meeting Report (Catherine Dumas)

 Catherine Dumas gave a brief report of the SIG Cabinet meeting. She shared the information about the newly elected Cabinet members, including SIG-III member, Abebe Rorissa.

International Reception

- This year we did not find a local student chapter or LIS school to help us prepare the gift basket with local goods that would have been used to give out to first and second place winners of the raffle ticket sales. Shimelis Assefa and Abebe Rorissa went out to a local store to purchase the gift basket. Shimelis announced that the International Reception will take place later in the night at 8:00 pm in room PARK VIEW. Shimelis called on everyone to attend and help in organizing the international reception and selling the raffle tickets.
- Toni Carbo announced that she has brought over 30 different items to be used for silent auction during the evening reception. One of the keynote speakers from Scotland, Dr. Sarah Morton, donated a scotch whisky for the silent auction that later fetched about \$65.
- The proceeds from the Silent Auction and the Raffle ticket sale goes to support ASIS&T membership for scholars and information professionals from developing countries through the InfoShare program.

Other Business

- Abebe Rorissa gave updates about the survey he developed to explore the possibility of translating the table of contents of the ASIS&T Bulletin. The survey was sent out to gather information about the number of different languages that the table of contents can be translated into and identify volunteers who can do the work.
- Catherine briefed attendants about the new members/first conference brunch. She noted the brunch was a bit rushed due to lack of time.
- Shimelis gave information about social media use by SIG-III. He noted that Catherine Dumas has maintained SIG-III's Facebook and Twitter presence active.
- One issue of the newsletter was published during the year and Shimelis noted that Lama will send out a call for contribution soon after the conference ended.
- Loni Hagen, Ph.D. student from the University of South Carolina, agreed to serve as the mentor for the new leaders award and she has been paired with one mentee.
- Shimelis called on attendees to volunteer for unfilled officer positions. Anindita Paul stepped up to be the new InfoShare officer. Zamir agreed to serve as one of the communication officers, and Yao Zhang agreed to serve as the chair-elect.
- Catherine encouraged to make the effort to use special projects fund available up to \$10k for innovative ideas

and most importantly working collaboratively with other SIGs. The request can be submitted anytime during the year. Catherine noted that research components for the proposal were not a requirement and she added that the fund is replenished annually.

- Zamir Hassan talked about an idea that could be submitted to the special projects fund. He suggested developing an online learning platform modeled after MOOC with a focus in the information science discipline to benefit students in developing countries.
- Given that the next ASIS&T AM is in Europe, several ideas were discussed around what SIG-III can do and how to prepare for the annual reception evening. One idea suggested was to work with the Royal school of Library and Information Science in Denmark.
