Christopher Eaker is Assistant Professor and Data Curation Librarian at the University of Tennessee. He comes to the field of library and information science after a long and successful career as a civil engineer, having earned a bachelor of science degree in civil and environmental engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology in 2000. As a registered professional engineer in Tennessee and Georgia, he practiced as an engineer for almost ten years designing drinking water and wastewater pipelines and treatment systems throughout the southeast.

He entered the field of library and information science to embark on a new career where his technical background could be useful. He brings to the field expertise gained in dealing with scientific and engineering data, problem solving, and project management along with his practical engineering knowledge and experience. He was chosen to be one of three students to be awarded a fellowship at the University of Tennessee in the Data Curation Education in Research Centers (DCERC) project, a grant funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services to train students from diverse scientific backgrounds in data curation and data management best practices. The DCERC program provides Christopher with the specialized knowledge for the future of scientific research and data curation. As a student, Christopher has engaged widely with the profession through presenting posters and lightning talks at conferences in the USA and Europe, participating in panels, and contributing to online resources for librarians. He has been a regular author on the *Hack Library School* blog, as well as the *e-Science Communities* blog. Moreover, he has published reviews of the book Managing Research Data for *Issues in Science and Technology Librarianship* and the DMPTool *for Public Services Quarterly*.
