


Shift in emphasis from *fiction to nonfiction* in reading and writing:

Note the increased emphasis on nonfiction through the grade level progression. Note you may hear nonfiction called literary non-fiction.



Common Core State Standards are organized by:

Strands -major areas of study: reading, writing, listening/speaking and language.


Topics -organizational grouping of the standards

Standard Statements - essential knowledge and skills to be learned at each grade level or grade band

Here is a graphic representation of the strands, topics and standard statements. Note: the number of topics and standard statements is not exact in this illustration.



These vertical alignments from the English Language Arts Common Core demonstrate the research strands in the Writing standards. Notice the scaffolding that occurs from one grade level to another.

The CCSS include anchor standards which can be found at the beginning of each strand. Because there are 10 standards for reading, there are 10 anchor standards. In addition to the anchor standards, there are three appendices that can further assist teachers. The Common Core also includes the literacy standards for History, Science, and other Technical Subjects for grades 6-12.

Appendix A – an excellent resource for understanding the topic of text complexity. **Appendix B** – provides examples of grade appropriate text for each grade level. Caution: These titles are not to be used as a reading list. They are *examples* of text complexity appropriate for each grade. Appendix B also provides examples of performance tasks related to the exemplar texts for each grade level.

Appendix C – provides student writing exemplars for each grade level.


Three Big Ideas

- 3. Students must **write** argumentative and explanatory texts in every discipline (process writing and on-demand writing).



Process writing – drafts required; on-demand writing – in classroom setting




PARCC is an alliance of 24 states, educating nearly 25 million students, that are working together to develop a common set of K-12 assessments in English and math anchored in what it takes to be ready for college and careers. PARCC is led by 18 governing board states (and D.C.) represented in Dark Blue.

Achieve is the project manager for PARCC, essentially serving as the staff for the consortium and coordinating the work. Collectively the PARCC states educate nearly 25 million students.


Governing States will pilot and field test the assessment system components over the next three years and administer the new assessment system during the 2014-15 school year. Governing States will use the results from the PARCC assessments in their state accountability systems

The chief state school officers of the Governing States serve on the PARCC Governing Board and make decisions on behalf of the Partnership on major policies and operational procedures

Participating States (light blue) provide staff to serve on PARCC's design committees,


