I LEARNED:



MY PRESENTATION OR CONTRIBUTION TO THE CONFERENCE WAS ABOUT:

I co-organized a workshop on “RDF Application Profiles in Cultural Heritage”. My presentations included the workshop introduction (about RDF validation and the Dublin Core taskforce on RDF application profiles), a presentation of the DM2E model (= an application profile of the Europeana Data Model) and how data modeled in DM2E can be validated.

I LEARNED:

I have learned about many interesting Linked Data case studies like an application profile for the Pina Bausch archive, multilingual access to Europeana, the SKOS publishing platform Skosmos and much much more.

I REALLY LIKED:

Eric Miller stating in his keynote that libraries are so invisible on the Web right now; coffee shops have greater visibility.

MY RECOMMENDATION FOR OTHER STUDENTS ATTENDING THE SAME CONFERENCE IS:

Go to SWIB! A great conference if you are interested in libraries **and** Semantic Web. You should have some metadata/RDF-background, otherwise it may be hard to follow some presentations.

Re:inventing Information Science in the Networked Society

14th International Symposium of Information Science (ISI 2015)

May 19 – 21, 2015 at the University of Zadar, Zadar, Croatia

Description

ISI 2015 takes place at a time of ongoing changes in today's networked society. Recent Internet developments have made it possible to access ever rising amounts of data and efficient analysis tools empower users to identify patterns which extend their human mind. Easy-to-use web services also allow users to be producers of information, a development which is subsumed under the term social web. Furthermore, science makes extensive use of collaboration, information sharing and information distribution which are available through network technologies (big data). These changes have a strong effect on both information science and practice which are to be discussed at ISI 2015.

Several submission types are possible. Specials for students include student presentations and doctoral thesis presentations. The Gerhard Lustig Award will be given to the author of the best Master Thesis in Information Science 2013-2014.
